

ASPATRIA

IS a parish in the ward of Allerdale below Derwent, including the townships of Aspatria with Brayton, Hayton, with Melay, and Outerside with Allerby. Aspatria town, or village, is 20 miles w. by s. of Carlisle, 9 s. w. from Wigton, 8 n. from Cockermouth, and 6 n. e. from Maryport. The name is derived from Gospatrick, first Lord of Allerdale. Solway Frith bounds this parish on the west, and the river Eilen on the south-east. In 1790 a *barrow* was opened on the north side of the village, when a skeleton of a man and some gold ornaments and military weapons were found enclosed in a vault; and on two stones, forming part of it, emblematical figures were sculptured: it was supposed to have been the tomb of a warrior of the sixth century. A battle-axe, a spur and a bridle-bit, much corroded, and bearing marks of Roman origin, were also found here; some of which are in the possession of Mr. Thomas Rigg, of Carlisle, and the remainder

in that of Mr. Richard Rigg, of Wigton. Aspatria is a polling station for the western division of the county.

The ancient church of Saint Centigern was superseded, and opened in 1849, by a new one, upon an enlarged scale, and in the early English style of architecture, after a design furnished by Messrs. Travis and Mangnall, architects, Manchester. Its Norman features will inviolably be preserved, including the doorway, the beautiful arch between the nave and the chancel, and the font: these are noticed in Sir Walter Scott's "Border Antiquities." The rebuilding and restorations cost upwards of £3,600: the entire was destroyed by the spirited contributions of the inhabitants: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the See of Carlisle. The Independents have a neat chapel, erected in 1827. A small market is held on Thursday. The population of the township in 1851, was 1,123 inhabitants.
