Is a parish in the ward of Allerdale below Derwent, in that of Mr. Richard Rigg, of Wigton. Aspatria is including the townships of Aspatria with Brayton, Hayton, with Melay, and Outerside with Allerby. Aspatria town, orv illage, is 20 miles w. by s. of Carlisle, 9 s. w. from Wigton, 8 N. from Cockermouth, and 6 N. E. from Waryport. The name is derived from Gospatrick, first Lord of Allerdale.
